The weekend will be led by Dr Tony Kempster, project director of Movement for the Abolition of War, with assistance from singer-songwriter, Sue Gilmurray. Both are officers of The Anglican Pacifist Fellowship.

Tony is also a vice-president of the International Peace Bureau (Geneva), general secretary of The Anglican Pacifist Fellowship and a director of The Peace Museum (Bradford). He brings a wide range of knowledge and experience to the weekend.

Topics covered will include:

- 1. The threats that humanity faces, particularly global warming and the lack of resources, and how these may lead to military conflict;
- 2. The international arms trade and development of new weapons;
- 3. The human cost of war, as experienced both by those involved in military activities and innocent civilians;
- 4. The pacifist position and whether any war today can be considered a Just War.

The topics will be considered with a strong emphasis on the action that civil society should be taking to reduce militarism and prevent war. Each topic will be the subject of a group discussion.

MAW uses the Arts, particularly music and film, in its education and in peace campaigning. These will feature throughout the weekend. The "Women peacemakers" exhibition from The Peace Museum will be displayed over the weekend.

## **Hilfield Friary**

is the mother house of the Anglican Society of St Francis founded here in the 1920s. Set in 19 acres overlooking the Blackmore Vale. Here there is a new community being developed, made up of brothers and lay members. During this weekend you will be staying in Bernard and Juniper Houses which are named after the early companions of Francis. Your meals will be in these houses and with this in mind we invite participants to share in the preparation of meals and the washing up. All of the sessions take place in the lounge of Juniper House.

The weekend begins with supper on Friday at 6.30pm and will finish after lunch on Sunday. Please feel free to come anytime on Friday afternoon; Evening Prayer takes place in Francis Chapel at 5.15pm and you are very welcome to start your stay in prayer with the community.
